Background

In recent years several issues facing North Africa have become more and more comparable to the issues facing the rest of Africa. Additionally, the rest of Africa is experiencing economic growth, and the Mediterranean-facing countries are increasingly looking south for trade and investment opportunities.

Among the more frequently mentioned issues of common interest are the following:

- **Economic issues**: Continental Free Trade Area (CFTA) issues and related trade opportunities; investment opportunities; infrastructure development; energy resources; industrialization; production value chains; innovation
- Social issues: poverty; gender equity; education and health services; employment; urbanization; social protection; migration and displaced populations; violence against women; cultural heritage
- Environmental issues: climate change; water resources; biodiversity; sustainable agriculture; natural resources management; endangered species
- Creating a sustainable future for think tanks in Africa: effective communication, resource mobilization, human resource management, research utilization and impact.

The adoption of the Sustainable Development Goals in September 2015 marked the initiation of a new global effort to eradicate poverty in all its forms. The 17 goals and 169 targets are now a global mandate for all nations to make life better for their people, and are designed to encompass the interrelated and interdependent actions relating to their achievement. They are also consistent with the vision spelled out in Africa's Agenda 2063, endorsed by African Heads of State two years earlier. As such, it would be of great interest for countries facing similar challenges, for think tanks – organizations devoted to doing the deep thinking to help policy-makers make informed decisions – to share their challenges and successes so that all their countries can be smarter in designing their futures.

It will also be an excellent opportunity to explore how think tanks can implement the strategies developed in previous Summits to enhance capacity, increase impact and assure the long term viability of think tanks in the region. Much work has been done lately on the issue of making think tanks "fit for purpose", in terms of quality, vibrancy, relevance and sustainability. More think tanks from across Africa would benefit from learning about and finding ways to introduce innovations and adaptations identified in other think tank fora.

Conference Venue, Date and Participation

Accordingly, a meeting is being convened for African think tanks to interact on issues of common concerns and share solutions relating to strengthening the role of think tanks in building a sustainable and secure future for the people and institutions in Africa. The event, which will take place from Monday-Wednesday, 2-4 May in Marrakesh, Morocco, will be hosted by the OCP Policy Center, in partnership with the Think Tanks and Civil Societies Programme of the University of Pennsylvania, and the UN Economic Commission for Africa. Directors of approximately 80 think tanks are being invited. French-English interpretation services will be available throughout.



Conference Objective and Expected Outcomes

The Conference will feature a dialogue between think tanks located in each of Africa's subregions – North, West, Central, East and Southern. Emphasis will be placed on the East and Southern think tank participants sharing their experiences with the North, West and Central think tank participants, to help clarify the role of these think thanks in supporting SDGs and Agenda 2063, COP22, CFTA and sustainability.

Objective: The Objectives of the Think Tank Conference is to identify strategic contributions from think tanks in Africa for making progress on four key common areas of concern:

- Implementing the SDGs/Agenda 2063 engaging Think Tanks in support of SDG and Agenda 2063 programming, operationalizing and monitoring
- Climate Change preparing for COP22, being held in November in Marrakesh, in terms of common issues and implementation strategies
- **Trade and economic exchanges** in the context of the ongoing effort to introduce Africa's Continental Free Trade Area (CFTA).
- Establish a Sustainable Futures Task Force: creating a working group to develop and help implement strategies and programs that will create a sustainable future for Africa's think tanks.

Outcomes: Under these three headings, the conference is expected to generate the following outcomes:

- **Suggestions on the way forward**, in terms of actions participating think tanks can take, individually and collectively, to further the three thematic agendas
- **Recommendations for sustainability,** in terms of innovations and adaptations needed for participating think tanks to produce quality work and remain vibrant and relevant.
- **Professional and Institutional linkages between think tank's scholars and executives** to promote opportunities for knowledge sharing of and collaboration around solutions identified

Format

The Conference will follow a tested format introduced by the Think Tanks and Civil Societies Programme – an opening panel of thought leaders in the evening of the first day (Monday 2 May), followed by a welcome reception, and then 1½ days of consultations with presentations panels, breakout sessions and keynote addresses. The format is intended to maximize interaction between participants to allow for networking, exploration of issues, and sharing of knowledge and experiences.
