BUILDING BACK BETTER: PLANNING WORKSHOP FOR CLIMATE RESILIENT INVESTMENT IN RECONSTRUCTION AND DEVELOPMENT IN CYCLONE AFFECTED REGIONS OF MALAWI, MOZAMBIQUE AND ZIMBABWE

Rainbow Towers, Harare, Zimbabwe 23-25 October 2019

Objective:

The overall objective of this workshop is to initiate a series of initiatives to support the integration of climate information services and climate change considerations into resilience building in climate sensitive sectors of the economies of SADC countries. The workshop will review the status of climate information services in the region, explore tools and methods for enhancing the mainstreaming of climate change in development planning, and begin to identify concrete actions towards climate proofing economic activities, ecosystems, human settlements and physical infrastructure especially in areas projected to be impacted by extreme weather and climate events. The workshop will hear from countries first hand experiences of what the impacts of Idai were, why these impacts happened, share lessons learned from countries affected by Tropical Cyclone Idai and introduce participants to the types of climate information that are available, as well as to tools and methods for analysing this information and its applications in decision making.

Specific objectives of the workshop will include, among others:

- Reflect on the concept and practice of DRR in the context of cyclone IDAI and other hazards in SADC region
- Review the status of weather and climate information services (CIS) in Africa, with focus on the uptake and use of CIS in development planning and practice

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- Document experiences and lesson learned from cyclones Idai, Kenneth and Desmond and explore the empirical estimates of their economic impacts;
- obtain key inputs for developing appropriate strategies/programmes/projects briefs to inform appropriate investments in improved weather and climate forecasting and their applications in sustainable socioeconomic development;
- demonstrate the utility of Social and Economic Benefit (SEB) model in planning, investments, preparation for and management of weather- and climate-induced risks and disasters:
- identify the institutional and human capacities needs and gaps for better integration of Climate Information Services (CIS) into future infrastructure, ecosystems, settlement and other key development sectors;
- explore innovative strategies to mobilize resource for mainstreaming CIS in climate sensitive infrastructure planning.

The workshop will start with an exploration of the status and functions of weather and climate information services generally. This will then be followed by sharing of lessons and experiences from the cyclones Idai and Kenneth, review. These framing discussions will inform the rest of the workshop focus on tools and methods to mainstream CIS into development policy, planning and practice to build the resilience of economies, ecosystems and livelihoods to the impacts of climate change and variability.
