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Background and Rationale

- Part of the process of operationalising Agenda 2063 is the M&E Framework;
- Agenda 2063 M&E Framework → the instrument for assessing and reporting on performance on the implementation of Agenda 2063 FTYIP
 - Reports serve as the basis for mutual accountability and peer learning;
 - Support decision making for accelerated attainment of Agenda 2063 results;
 - Initial steps on country implementation reports to the Assembly
- The focus is data entry, analysis, visualisation and empirical reporting using the core indicators of Agenda 2063 FTYIP

Further Outcomes

- The continental inaugural report was presented to the Ambassadorial and Ministerial Committees on Agenda 2063
- A presentation of the report together with presentations of 10 AU Member States reports provided the basis for ministerial-level panel discussions held at a side event at the margins of the 33rd Ordinary Session of the African Union
- The inaugural report was presented by the AU Champion of Agenda 2063 – H.E President Alassane Ouattara of Cote d'Ivoire at a High Level Forum at the margins of the 33rd Ordinary Session of the African Union
- The 33rd Ordinary Session of the African Union passed a Decision adopting the use the empirical data entry, analysis and reporting methodology in reporting on the implementation of Agenda 2063
