# NEPAD targets \$1b for youth empowerment

EPAD is to raise \$1 billion to support investments in agricultural research for development among unemployed youth.

The National Director, Information and Mobilisation, NEPAD Youth initiative, Prince Clement Enweremadu, made this known during the launching of CIS-Trade for Peace, Unity and Development and signing of Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between Youth Initiative, in Lagos. Enweremadu, who is the initiator of Collaboration, Initiation and Stabilisation (CIS) framework, said the NEPAD Youth Initiative would empower young and talented individuals through trade in agricultural produce and other commercial ventures.

According to him, NEPAD's emphasis on agricultural produce for trade among other commercial ventures, will enable Nigeria achieve food security as a nation.

He said the provisions of CIS trade for peace, unity and development framework was procedural, adding that it is the coming together of stakeholders in the identification of local products packaging agencies like the Federal Institute of Industrial Research, Oshodi (FIIRO), Nigerian Export Promotion Council, Nigerian Customs Service (NCS) and others.

"These collaborations shall enable us set industrial centres in all the states in Nigeria where youths shall be trained in different Continued on page 3

These remarks were made by Dr Ibrahim Mayaki, CEO of NEPAD this week, when he paid a courtesy call to Mr Mathurin Nago, Speaker of the Parliament of Benin, at the Embassy of Benin in Pretoria, South Africa yesterday.

Mr Nago was on a brief visit to South Africa to attend the annual conference of speakers of African Parliaments at the Pan-African Parliament (PAP) in Midrand, near Johannesburg.

At the meeting, where various parliamentary issues were discussed, Dr Mayaki pointed out the important synergy between legislators, who are representatives of the people and NEPAD, mandated and committed to working for the people of Africa.

internationally recognised systems of farming, and other economic oriented practice," he explained.

The National Director of Information and Mobilisation, further disclosed that NEPAD Youth plans to embark on exchange programmes with the international community, especially the Federal Republic of Germany, which includes importation of equipment to enhance product handling and packaging to boost trade.

According to Enweremadu, NEPAD Youth shall embark on a sensitisation programme in Europe, Asia and America starting from November. He appealed to corporate organi-

Dr Mayaki welcomed this proposal and called it "inspirational" and a "timely request" with a view to the Republic of Benin, holding the chair of the African Union for a period of 12 months, and leading and shaping the future of NEPAD.

South Sudan President Salva Kiir Mayardit on his part said the loss of Meles is very sad not only for the people of Ethiopia but also for the people of South Sudan, the region and for the whole Africa as well. "He was a great leader and he will be missed by the African people", the President added.

AfDB President Donald Kaberuka also said that it is not exaggeration to say that Meles was a transformation leader. He was a leader who devoted himself for his people and for Africa. The best way to acknowledge Meles is by continuing the work he did for Ethiopia and Africa. Donald further said "The African Development Bank is a sole partner of Ethiopia, I have worked closely with Meles on African and international issues and I will guarantee you that we will honor his legacy by showing what he has achieved."

The CEO of NEPAD, Dr. Ibrahim Mayaki on his part said: "I am personally very sad because I lost a very intelligent boss for whom I had an immense pleasure to work for. So, his ideas will live with us and to make his ideas live will be our role. I can assure you that we will do our job in that regard"
